#### Colorado Annual Conference

- The Colorado Annual Conference was organized September 24, 1887 in Shorter Chapel Denver, Colorado. Bishop J. M Brown was the presiding prelate. The Conference included the states of Colorado, Utah, Wyoming, Montana, Arizona and New Mexico. Montana was later transferred to the Pacific Northwest.
- The name was changed to the Desert Mountain Conference at the 2004 General Conference under the leadership of President L.C. DeMon Carey.





## 1955 Organization of Laymen Annual Convention

- On July 27-30, 1955, the Fifth District Laymen's Organization of the A.M.E. Church held its First Annual Convention at Campbell Chapel AMEC in Denver, Colorado. R.J. Reynolds was President.
- The 1955 District Convention adopted an objective called "Opposition to the Division of the Fifth District."; the creation of the Department of Lay Activities, the establishment of voting machines use, and the raising of standards for election. They also worked hard at upholding the eight-year law regarding Bishops.



Tom attended AZSU World Ministries Training Institute in Glendale, AZ;


Tom currently serves as an Evangelist of the Desert Mountain Conference, AMEC.

## President L.C. DeMon Carey 2000-2008








#### **President Carey**

## **Tanner Chapel**

- Historic Tanner Chapel African Methodist Episcopal Church is the oldest African American Church in the State of Arizona.
- It was established during the pioneer days when Charles Ward, N. D. Valentine, Laura Valentine and Sister Bell met with the Reverend H. H. Hawkins proposing the establishment of a Christian mission to foster "family life." Courthouse records show that in 1886, property was owned by an African Methodist Episcopal Mission.
- The African Methodist Episcopal Mission was named Tanner Chapel African Methodist Episcopal Church in honor of Bishop Benjamin T. Tanner.





#### **Shorter**

- Shorter Community AME Church, organized in July 1868, by Bishop Thomas M.D. Ward, was the first African-American Church established in Colorado. The Church has grown form a log cabin erected in lots at the corner of 19th and Holladay Streets (now Market Street) to its current locations, "Freedom Crossroads", Martin Luther King Boulevard and Richard Allen Court.
- Historically, the Shorter family has always built its house of worship and never has occupied a previously owned building.
- In 1880, to honor the presiding Bishop, James A. Shorter, St. John AME Church was renamed Shorter Chapel.





## **Trinity**

- Trinity was organized during the 1880's by the Reverend T. Saunders. In 1907, after years of holding church meetings in private homes, the congregation of the Trinity African Methodist Episcopal Church fundraised and purchased the land property where the Trinity A.M.E. still stands today.
- In addition to providing religious services, the Trinity A.M.E. played a critical role in the development of community for African Americans in Salt Lake City between 1890 and 1910.
- This congregation has served as a focus of Black religious, social, and cultural activity in Utah from territorial days to the present.





## Campbell

- According to Sister Fannie Allen, Campbell's history began on 5 August 1886 when a group of Christian believers met in the home of Brother and Sister McGuire at 995 Delaney Street in West Denver; there the West Side Mission was formed. Campbell's first pastor, the Reverend James Thomas Smith, worked and labored diligently with the membership which soon purchased a house at 33rd and Larimer Streets.
- Bishop Thomas H. D. Ward assigned Rev. John Turner as the Pastor; Reverend Dr. Paul Hubbard was the Presiding Elder at that time. It was under Turner's administration that the Paul Quinn Mission was renamed Campbell Chapel AME Church.





## **Grant Chapel**

- Grant Chapel African Methodist Episcopal (AME) Church was the first black church in New Mexico and was organized during the state's territorial period. Although New Mexico Territory had a few slaves before the Civil War, African Americans began arriving in the region in significant numbers after the conflict.
- By the 1870s several <u>Buffalo Soldier</u> units were stationed in the Territory. By the 1880s they were joined by coal miners, ranch hands, and settlers who had established a foothold around Albuquerque.

In July 1905 the name of the church was changed to Grant Chapel African Methodist Episcopal Church in honor of Bishop Alexander Grant, a former Florida slave who escaped and joined the Union Army and then returned to Florida after the Civil War to preach and teach.
